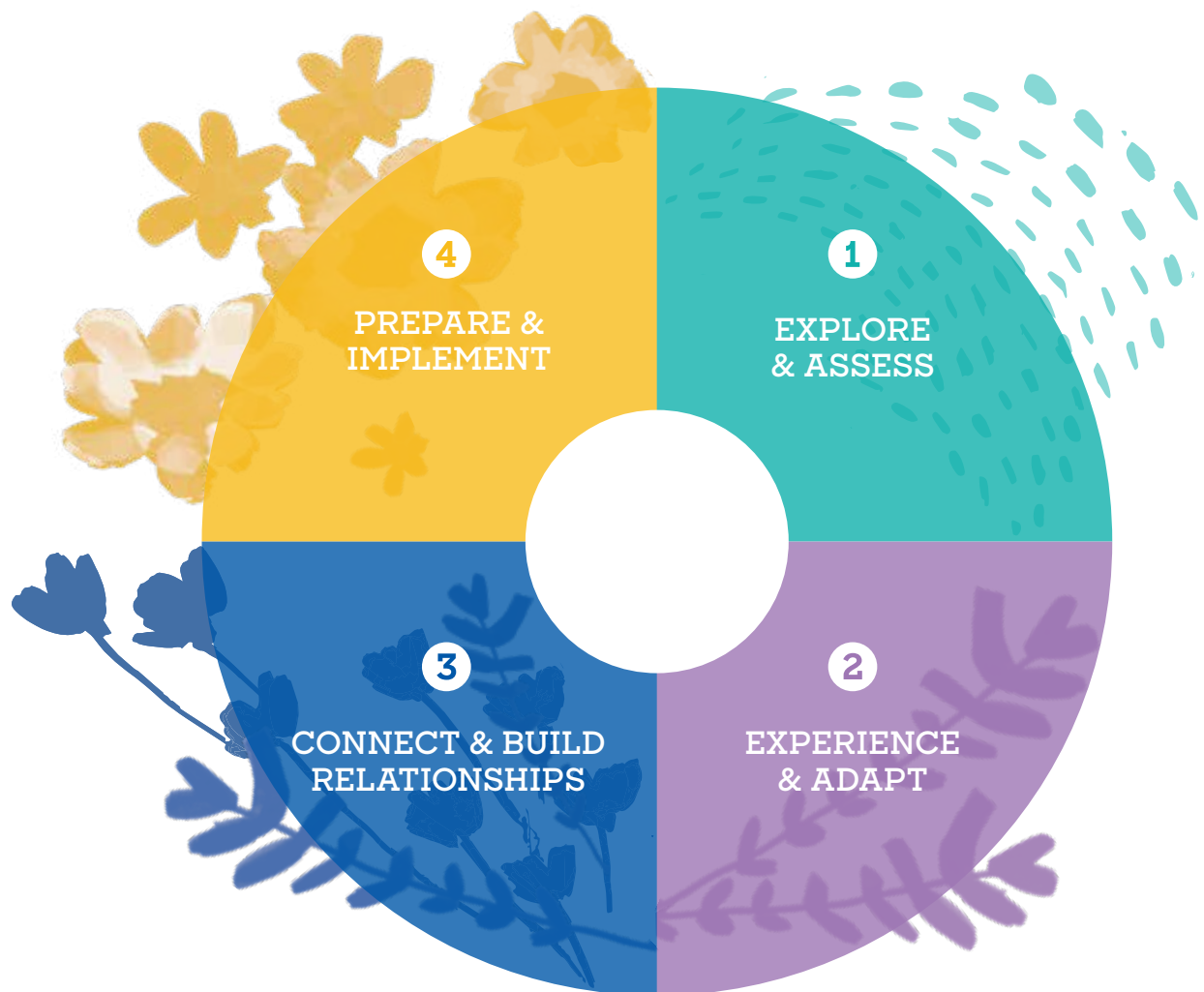

Career Advising: Exploration & Industry-Specific Guidance

The Susan L. Wagner '82 Career Advising Program supports students and alums in two main ways:

Advisors for Career Exploration (ACEs) are assigned to students by class year and are available for conversations about values, strengths, and interests. ACEs provide tools and connections to help students identify the paths they want to pursue, and support students in fulfilling their experiential learning requirement.

Industry Advisors support students as they build interest in specific fields. They offer insight into career pathways, including guidance on internship options, job searches, and graduate or professional school applications.

Peer Career Mentors

Career Education's team of Peer Career Mentors are trained to provide feedback on resumes and cover letters, host career workshops, and advise their peers through Quick Question Drop-In hours. They are passionate about supporting their fellow students and serve as ambassadors for the work of Career Education across campus.

Wellesley-Funded Internships & Grants

Career Education collaborates with employers and academic departments across the College to offer placements and funding for more than **300 paid internships** each year across all career industries and many geographic locations. In addition to internships with employer partners, Career Education also offers grants for student-identified unpaid opportunities. There are two annual application periods:

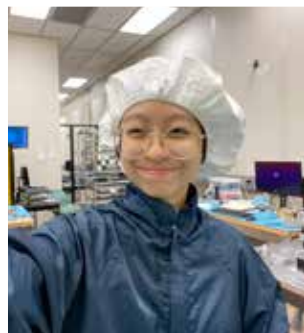

Short Internship Projects (SHIPs)

Short Internship Projects (SHIPs) are 60-80 hour virtual summer internship projects for first-year students. All SHIPs are paid at least \$1,000. Students who participate have the opportunity to explore their early career interests, build skills, and gain industry knowledge. Through their short internship project, students develop a mentorship relationship with a Wellesley alum, parent, or employer partner.



Student Employment

Student Employment offers opportunities for students to connect with the Wellesley community and develop skills beyond the classroom. Career Education partners with Human Resources in supporting students as they use these on-campus opportunities to build career readiness competencies.

Beginning with students entering in Fall 2024, the Wellesley College degree now includes a requirement of **two experiential learning units**. These units can be fulfilled through internships, research, study abroad, civic engagement, select courses and student employment positions, and more. Students can meet with their Advisor for Career Exploration (ACE) for support with the ELR.

Fellowships & Scholarships

Fellowships can fund a broad variety of experiences, such as undergraduate and postgraduate research, study abroad, service opportunities, graduate and professional study, independent projects, and teaching — in the U.S. and around the world. There are a wide range of opportunities for domestic and international students and alums.

The Fellowships team helps students and alums navigate the full application process: from brainstorming ideas and possibilities, draft review, application submission, interview preparation, and beyond.

The Tanner Conference

The Tanner Conference is an annual campus-wide event where students present about their experiential learning opportunities, including internships, civic engagement, and study abroad. Presenters share their insights and growth with peers, while attendees learn about the ways in which such experiences can complement the classroom experience.



Civic Engagement

Built upon the foundation of Wellesley's motto, *Non Ministrari Sed Ministrare*, the Civic Engagement program explores the role of social justice, community engagement, and leadership across all majors and career fields. The program offers a wide range of opportunities for sustained, collaborative, and meaningful engagement that enriches the Wellesley liberal arts education.



The Clinton Fellows Program

The Clinton Fellows Program is a unique sophomore year experience offered through the Hillary Rodham Clinton Center for Citizenship, Leadership, and Democracy. It is designed to prepare the next generation of civic leaders and engaged citizens across all areas of study. Students learn the principles of democracy and active citizenship through a year of intentional engagement with civic innovators, academic faculty, and community organizations.

Alumnae in Residence Programs

Various programs in Career Education now offer the opportunity for alumnae to engage intensively, or “in-residence,” with students throughout the year. Alumnae bring insights from the rapidly changing world of work directly to campus and infuse experiences with applied learning. Graduate, Professional, & Health Professions Applicant Support

Career Education supports students and alums who are exploring graduate and professional school throughout the application process via appointments and workshops. This includes the Health Professions Advising team who works with students pursuing careers in healthcare. Students applying to medical, dental, or podiatry school receive an individualized committee letter of support from the College.



Test Prep Materials

Career Education offers discounted Princeton Review test prep materials for students preparing for the GRE, LSAT, GMAT, MCAT, & DAT.

For students actively preparing for exams, test preparation books are available to be borrowed for four months.



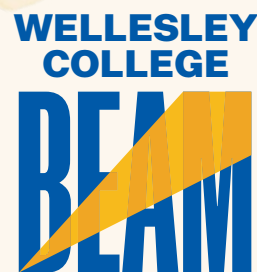
Wellesley College BEAM Initiative (Business, Entrepreneurship, & Money Management)

The BEAM initiative launched in 2024 thanks to the generosity of Lois D. Juliber '71, to support current and future business leaders and entrepreneurs, and ensure all students are empowered to pursue future career pathways as financially savvy graduates. This initiative covers three main areas:

Business: Through curated opportunities, including an Alumnae in Residence Program, BEAM exposes students to emerging and high-growth fields, inspiring them to shape the future of business and its role in society across industries.

Entrepreneurship: Students will have opportunities to cultivate a growth mindset, expand their entrepreneurial thinking, explore business planning, and gain experience interning with startups.

Money Management: Financial literacy workshops and training will soon roll out across campus to ensure students are empowered to pursue future career pathways as financially savvy graduates.

Wellesley in Business Symposium

The inaugural Wellesley in Business Symposium — “When Leadership Matters Most: Shaping the Future in Turbulent Times,” will be hosted by the BEAM initiative in partnership with the Wellesley Business Leadership Council (BLC) in November 2025. The Symposium will provide new preparation pathways and exposure for current students, including a Case Competition, and create a space where the Wellesley community can come together to learn, grow, and advance women in business.



Upskill: Skill-Building Intensives

Upskill skill-building intensives are one-week, immersive programs during Wintersession where students gain exposure to specific industries and skill sets. Students hear from experts, visit relevant organizations, and apply what they’re learning through hands-on projects. In January 2026, Career Education will offer six tracks: AI for Social Impact, Entrepreneurship, Investment Banking, Journalism, Medical Professions, and Software Development Lifecycle.

Wellesley's Career Education model was redesigned in 2016, thanks to a transformative gift from two distinguished alumnae — Lulu Chow Wang '66 and Susan L. Wagner '82. Eight years later, the power of that investment is ever more apparent, with nearly 100% of each graduating class actively engaged in our model throughout their time at Wellesley. Appointments with Career Education grew from 1,900 during the 2015–2016 academic year to over 7,500 by 2024–2025. The Career Education team, introduced below, cares deeply about supporting students and alums and helping them flourish in their chosen career paths.

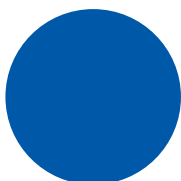

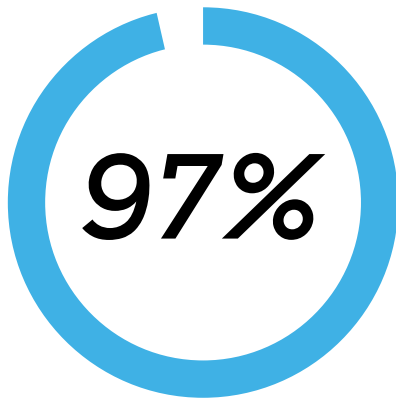

CLASS OF 2024 FIRST DESTINATION OUTCOMES

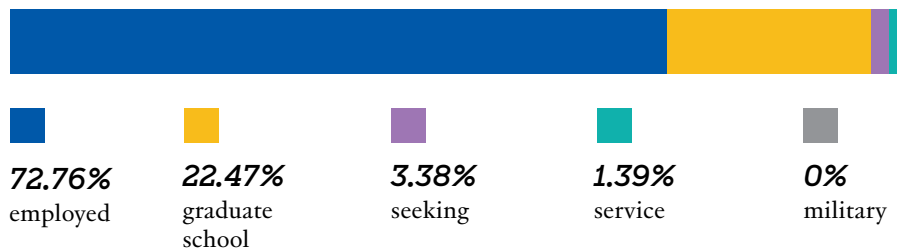
Career Education complements the liberal arts curriculum by supporting our graduates in translating any field of study to their desired career or academic aspirations.

Class of 2025 data will become available in January 2026.

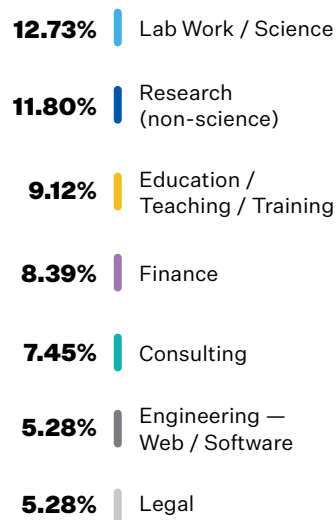


The 97% Career Outcomes Rate includes graduates who were employed, accepted to graduate school, participating in a service program, or serving in the military within 6 months of graduation.

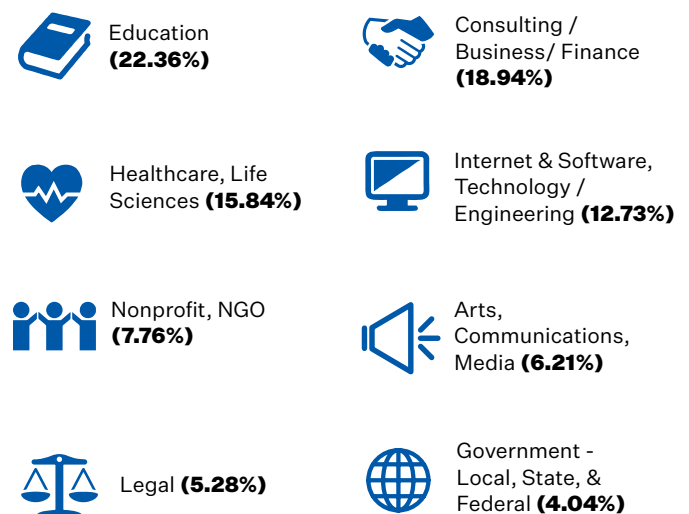
